Term-Time Leave of Absence

Changes in the law mean that Head Teachers can no longer grant leave of absence in term-time unless there are exceptional circumstances for the absence. The following reasons are NOT considered as exceptional:

- Holidays taken in term time due to lower costs, parental work commitments or once in a life time experiences.
- Holidays abroad for the purpose of visiting a sick relative
- Holidays booked as a surprise by relatives

Parents of children who have regular unauthorised absences or who take their children on holiday during term time may receive a penalty notice and a fine of £60 per parent per child. If this is not paid within 28 days the fine rises to £120. If no payment is made you could face court action.
