



Who are SOS Africa?

To celebrate Picture New's recent partnership with the charity SOS Africa, this week's newspaper is a special, focusing on the education and the children of South Africa.

The SOS Africa Children's Charity is a small UK based organisation which invests donations in the education and care of African children. Since 2003 they have provided 90 disadvantaged children, from ages 7 to 15, with a personal education programme.

Without the help of sponsors, the children

supported by SOS Africa would have little hope of securing any education at all. Often the only government schools available to these children have average class sizes of between 100 to 200.

Driving lessons to be included as part of South African curriculum!

The South African Road Traffic Infringement Agency have announced a partnership which includes extending driving lessons into high school curriculums. This will mean children from the age of 16 will be taught driving as part of their everyday education.

Transport Minister Dipuo Peters said that the announcement was part of a long-term initiative to establish and enhance road safety by teaching important skills. He also added that it will not affect the teaching and learning of more traditional subjects.



Facts about education in South Africa:

- 🍏 Around 245,000 children of school-going age do not attend school.
- 🍏 19% of secondary school children travel at least 30 minutes to get to school.
- 🍏 Schooling is compulsory from Grades 1 to 9, school starts for the children in the year they turn 7 and they have to attend school until they are 15.
- 🍏 In Grade 3 a second language is introduced, usually Afrikaans or English which depends on the first language offered. Some schools offer French instead of Afrikaans.

Picture News are sponsoring the education of 7 year-old Mbali.




7 year-old Mbali pictured at school.
