## Belfast plane lands without nose gear

A Belfast passenger plane has landed without nose gear after it experienced technical issues and circled for an hour above the Irish Sea.

Fifty-three passengers and four crew members were on board the Flybe flight BE331 from Belfast City Airport to Inverness, which had to be diverted.

It eventually landed safely at Belfast International Airport at about 13:30 GMT.

The airline said one passenger was taken to hospital with a minor injury but no-one else was hurt.

The pilots have been praised by the British Airline Pilots' Association (BALPA).

"Landing without a nose gear is a very difficult manoeuvre, but one pilots train extensively for," BALPA commented.

The Flybe pilots "appear to have done a sterling job".
